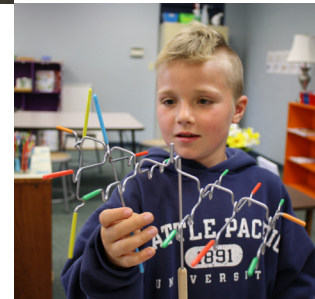

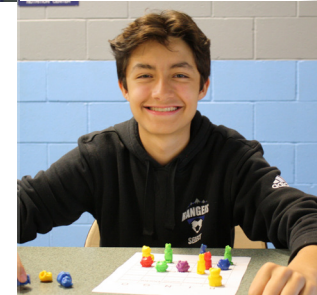

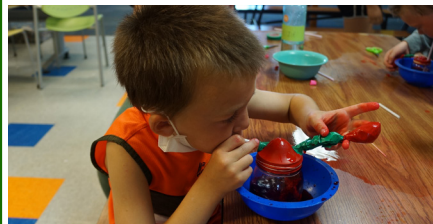

Academic Success

Boys & Girls Clubs understand that education is a primary pillar of youth development, and that providing out-of-school academic support strengthens the opportunities for young people to build their Great Future.

This year, we expanded the reach of our Academic Success program through the introduction of a structured literacy program, named Read & Dream. We created cozy reading corners at each Clubhouse and increased access to a variety of educational materials. Our new digital library complements our collection of tactile books and also includes multi-sensory immersive, interactive games that encourage literacy while also reinforcing STEM content and honing fine motor skills.

In response to a growing community need for quality afterschool care for five year olds, we strengthened our commitment to families through the inclusion of kindergarteners in three of our afterschool programs. To ensure our youngest members are not overwhelmed in our large Clubhouses, our kindergarteners are provided a separate space and staff person to help them become ready to successfully enter first grade.



Healthy Lifestyles

Boys & Girls Clubs are committed to embedding a trauma-informed and responsive approach to youth development throughout our Clubhouses. To help strengthen the social-emotional care we provide for young people, we received a grant that allowed us to hire a Mental Health & Behavioral Support Specialist who engages with youth in small groups, collaborates with staff to increase skills and engages with families to assist with accessing additional services.

To further support the social-emotional well-being of our members, we have provided all of our Club staff training in the use of PAX Tools for Human Services. This training helps our staff take a trauma-informed approach to working with youth and provides them with tools that are research based to use in the implementation of all programs.

Project L.A.N.E. (Lifestyle, Attitude, Nutrition, and Exercise), provides a solid foundation to help young people understand the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Through a variety of interactive games and thought-provoking activities, Project L.A.N.E. encourages healthy habits, good nutrition, and physical fitness every day. At the core of this important program are the nutritious meals and snacks that are served daily.



Good Character & Leadership

Our dynamic, county-wide Teen Program provides creative and expansive activities that connect with the many new experiences, responsibilities, and transitions that come with the teenage years. Our new TRANSFRVR headsets provide virtual reality work experiences to promote the exploration of a variety of career paths.

Back in actual reality, our teens work together to organize and spearhead community service projects, engage in the junior and senior level Youth of the Year competition, and learn valuable life skills such as financial literacy. They also receive daily homework support, participate in twice-weekly STEM sessions and engage in opportunities to strengthen their workforce readiness skills such as job seeking, resume creation and interview techniques.

In 2023, we plan to further expand opportunities to help prepare teens for adulthood by implementing the Road Code program which offers hands-on driving simulation to teach safe driving techniques.



Early Learning Centers

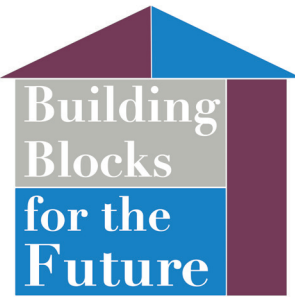
This year, we completed extensive remodels on the interiors of all four of our early learning centers. Each site has new flooring, paint, bathrooms, kitchens, and cabinetry. As part of the remodel at our Yew Street center we were able to increase the capacity of children served by 30% and for the first time, we are able to serve school-aged children at this site, allowing families the convenience of serving their children of different ages at the same center.

Through the implementation of the HighScope curriculum, which incrementally develops and prepares children for kindergarten, we have deepened our commitment to ensuring our childrens' success in all six areas of development and learning toward kindergarten readiness: math, literacy, physical, language, cognitive and social-emotional.

To ensure our staff are well-versed in behavior management strategies, the implementation of the HighScope curriculum as well as current licensing requirements, we utilize one early release day each month to provide valuable staff training opportunities and establish best practices that are consistently applied organization-wide.

In 2023, we plan to purchase two vans to improve transportation options and to make a significant investment to enhance our outdoor playground equipment to expand learning, development and growth opportunities outside of the classroom.





Capital Campaign to Purchase Our Four Early Learning Centers County-wide to Benefit Whatcom County Youth



The Need

In March 2020, we acquired the operations of four early learning centers, preventing the loss of 532 licensed care spots in Whatcom County.

In January 2021, we launched a four-phase capital campaign to purchase all four centers. In 2021, we completed phase one and purchased the Ferndale center. In 2022, we completed the fundraising for phase two - the purchase of the center located on Yew Street, Bellingham. In 2023, we will launch the fundraising for phase three which relates to the centers located at Home Road, Bellingham.

The completion of fundraising for this four-phase campaign will allow us to invest further in improvements to increase capacity as well as build equity for future investments.

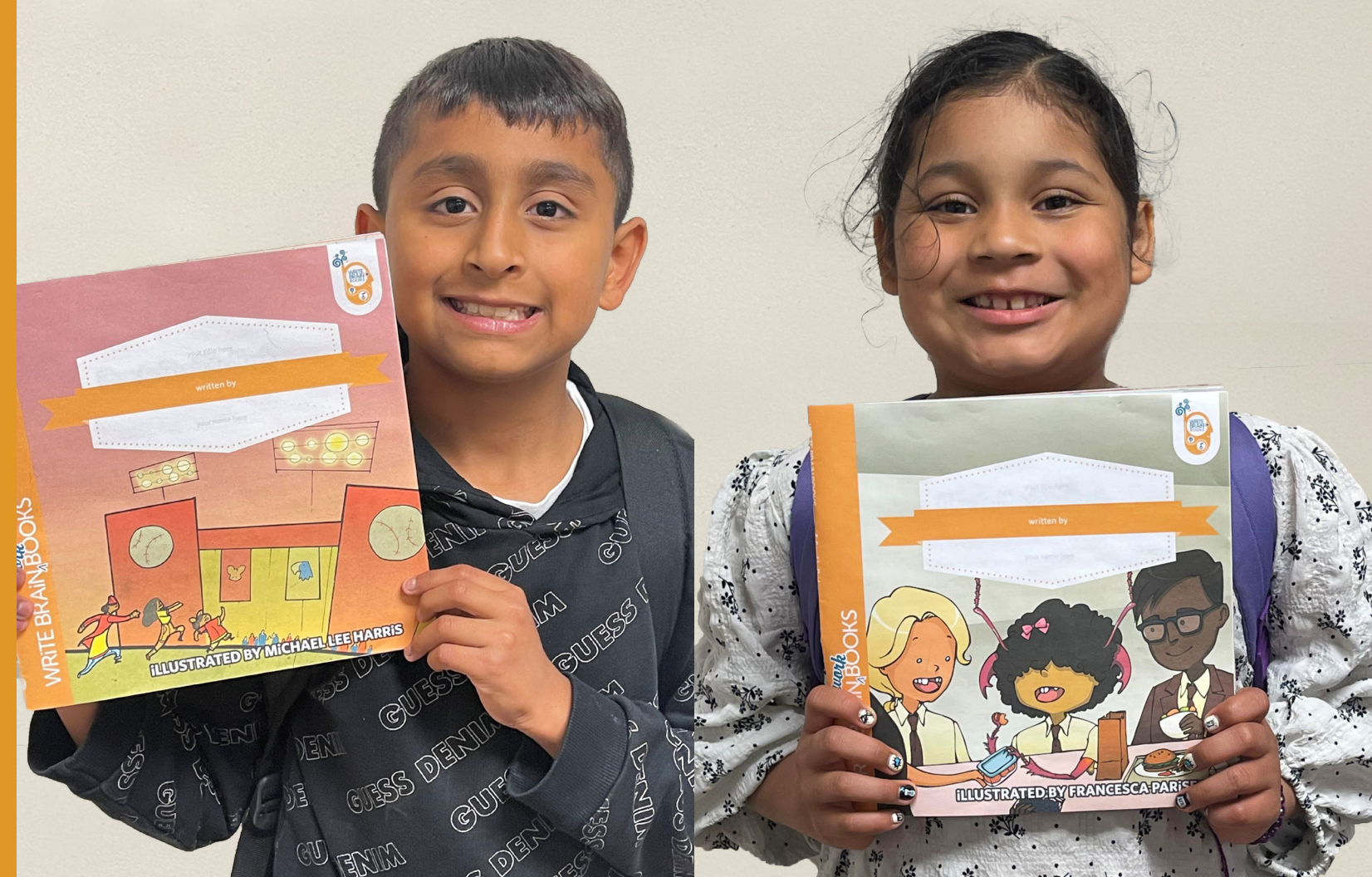

21st Century Community Learning Centers

Boys & Girls Clubs of Whatcom County partnered with the Mount Baker School District to provide 21st Century Community Learning Centers at Kendall Elementary and Mount Baker Junior High through federal funding. This five year grant concluded at the end of August.

This afterschool enrichment program provided literacy and math support, engaging STEM projects and a variety of life-enhancing programs that have an intentional focus on strengthening the physical, social and emotional well-being of students.

This year, we utilized the innovative, project-based learning literacy program, Write Brain, to encourage our children to develop their writing and creativity skills. Students worked collaboratively and independently to develop written stories. In addition to learning to problem solve, generate original ideas, as well as draft and revise narratives, every student became a published author when they received their custom, richly illustrated, professionally printed book. This unique opportunity helped every student to discover, develop, and share their voice.



Athletic Programs

At the Boys & Girls Club, we believe that youth sports play a valuable role in the social, emotional and physical growth of our children.

Through our year-round athletic program young people have the opportunity to play basketball, baseball, volleyball and flag football. This year, we expanded programming to include mini-basketball for children in kindergarten and first grade, and volleyball for athletes in the third and fourth grade.

Our staff and volunteer coaches teach participants the importance of good sportsmanship, teamwork, communication and discipline. We have increased resources for our dedicated coaches, including new skill-building drills while also deepening our already robust volunteer screening to strengthen the safe, supportive, and enriching environment we provide.



2022 Community Awards

Our Champion of Youth Awards recognize two outstanding community members who have gone above and beyond to support our Clubs in 2022.

We also recognized one volunteer coach who has been vital in the success of athletics this year.

Giving Societies



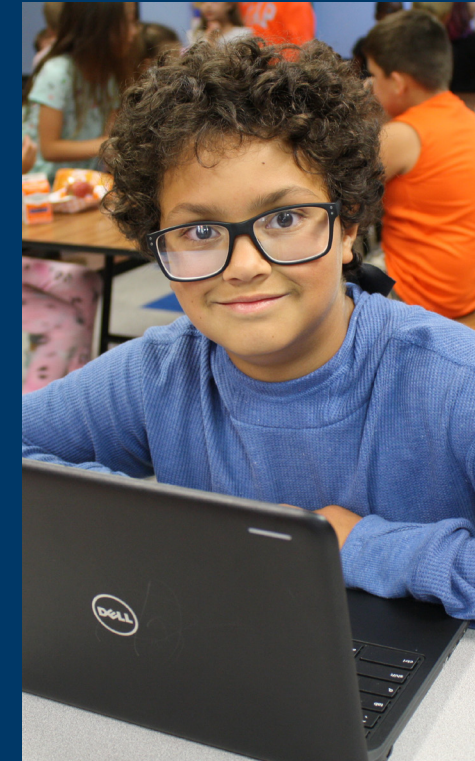
The Jeremiah Milbank Society was initiated by the Boys & Girls Clubs of America in 2004.

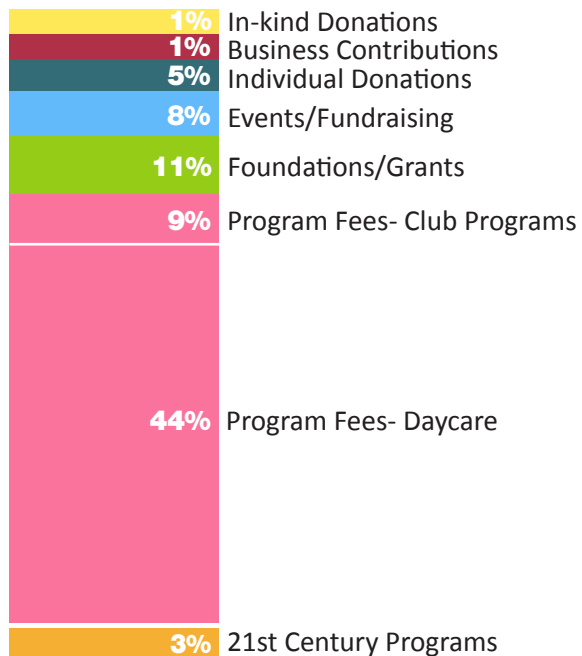
Endowment Fund

Income & Expense Summary

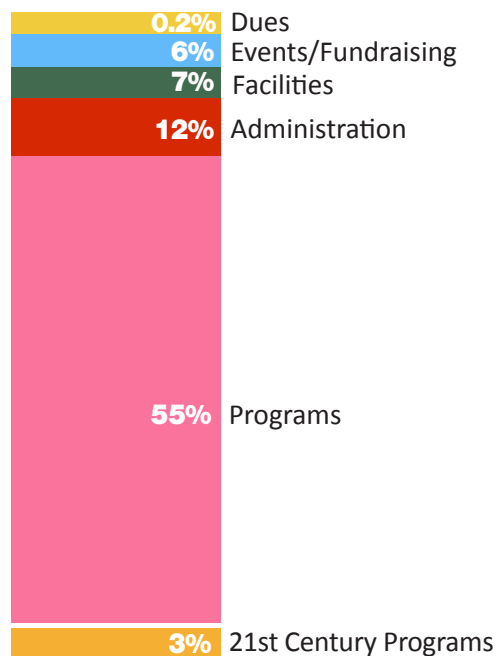


Regular Income: \$5,746,098
