



# STRATEGIC DIRECTION PROCESS CREATION

With our annual goals set, department leaders created the strategies they will use to achieve our objectives. This step happens each year and serves as our work plan.

With answers to the "5 Big Questions", we crafted the vision for who the youth in our community need us to be and set annual goals to achieve the vision.



We surveyed 100% of staff, and used threeyear trend data from BGCA to identify gaps in programming.

We held two community stakeholder meetings to gather feedback.

Using the data gathered, the Board of Directors and Senior Staff developed Five Focus Areas.

We assessed the resources needed to focus on the five themes.

## CLUBHOUSE LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT



In 2024 a partnership with the Northwest Education District brought us 12 Youth workers. These teens applied for work and then spent up to 120 hours each training and gaining valuable skills to be successful in the workforce while working in our Clubs.



Over 20 teens participated in our summer workforce readiness program that allows hands-on exposure to local career opportunities. These field trips ranged from tending crops at Whatcom County farms, to learning about nature conservation at Birch Bay State Park, to visiting a local library to see firsthand a day in the life of a librarian.



The Boys & Girls Clubs' Youth of the Year program is a premier leadership development initiative that recognizes and celebrates outstanding Club members who exemplify academic excellence, leadership, and service to their communities. This prestigious program empowers young people to share their stories, strengthen their leadership skills, and inspire others while preparing them for future success.



# EARLY LEARNING CENTER LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The implementation of dual-language classrooms in our Early Learning Centers promotes inclusivity by fostering cultural awareness and collaboration while simultaneously developing leadership skills from the earliest age through enhanced communication, adaptability, and teamwork across diverse perspectives.



The re-introduction of field trips in early learning center curricula this year helped to cultivate leadership skills by exposing children to new environments, encouraging curiosity and problem-solving, and fostering teamwork as they navigate experiences together, building confidence and resiliency.



Leadership development begins at the earliest stages of programming. Our HighScope curriculum fosters independence and decision-making skills through its active participatory learning approach. Children are encouraged to plan, execute, and reflect on their activities, building critical thinking and collaboration skills — key traits of effective leadership.



# **INCREASE SAFETY & CONSISTENCY**

## Our goal:

Provide young people with a secure environment where they are both physically and emotionally safe, so trust can be developed and they are able to thrive.

By offering consistent routines and dependable support, we create spaces where youth feel valued, supported, and empowered.

PaxTools is a curriculum for youth development staff that ensures all Club interactions are based on principles of equity, restoration justice, and trauma informed care. We use this as a guide for behavior interventions to be conducted in a therapeutic way to avoid re-traumatization and reinforce positive behaviors. Our trained Behavioral Support Specialist works with children individually and in groups to provide trauma informed care.

## Role of our Behavioral Support Specialist:

- Conduct small group mental health promotion sessions
- Assist families in navigating complex behavioral health resources in our community
  - Provide resources to staff to alleviate compassion fatigue
    - Conduct 1-1 mental health supports

# BGCWC participated in the PAXIS Institute study on social competence this year.

#### **IN 2024 WE SAW:**

- 40% INCREASED ABILITY TO EXPRESS FEELINGS APPROPRIATELY
- 36% INCREASE IN ACCEPTING WHEN THINGS DON'T GO THEIR WAY
- 42% INCREASE IN RESOLVING CONFLICT ON THEIR OWN
- 52% INCREASE IN BEING ABLE TO SELF-REGULATE BEHAVIORS


